Glossary of different types of Activists.

Click on the links to learn more about each type of activism and ways to help. You could create a powerpoint featuring some of the information that you find out that interests you. Or a poster that focuses on one activism method and a related issue. E.g. Environmental activism could lead to a poster that aims to raise awareness of the burning Amazon, what actions people can take, and point readers to a website they can go to to find out more. Or a poem related to an issue.

Environmental activist: Seek to stop actions that affect the natural [environment](#) negatively e.g [burning of the rainforest](#), deforestation, plastic pollution.

[Animal rights](#) activist: Seek justice and [proper treatment of animals](#) e.g. no animal testing, end to factory farming, end to puppy mills, [stop eating meat](#), etc.

Social justice activist: Aim for all members of a [society to be treated equally](#).

Anti-war activist: Attempt through a variety of means, including [protest marches](#), to convince their government to stop taking part in a war. Eg. [Vietnam](#) anti-war activists

Anti-nuclear activist: [This movement](#) would like to [see an end](#) to nuclear weapons and energy. It believes countries should disarm their nuclear weapons and stop [nuclear testing](#).

[Peace](#) activist: Believes that [war and conflict](#) should be settled by [peaceful methods](#). Essentially not using weapons, violence or wars to solve problems.

Civil rights activist: Usually part of a political group that fights for [equality](#) for all civilians. The most famous civil rights movement, historically, was the [black rights movement during the 1950s and 1960s](#).

Children's rights activist: Stand up for [children's rights](#), and protect children against injustices.

Women's rights activist: Someone who campaigns, raises awareness, and actively strives for equality for women. [Masala Yousafzai](#) lived in a patriarchal society, and fought for women's equality in education in Pakistan. [Patriarchal](#) means that males hold the power over political, social, moral and economic management. So, men have the say and woman need to obey!

Human rights activist: As members of the human race we all have basic [human rights](#) assigned to us at birth. Everyone has the right to [express an opinion](#), to have a private life, to receive an education and to have a state that upholds justice and treats its citizens fairly. [The Human Rights Act, 1998](#) was created to protect human rights by law. Although, some people/groups/countries/states deny people's human rights. Activists fight to uphold these rights.

LGBT rights activists: Aim to change laws and legislation, so that members of the [LGBT community](#) have the same rights as non LGBT people e.g. adoption, marriage. Also to, raise awareness to wider society about LGBT discrimination. And to fight [hate crime](#).

Disability rights activist: Aim to [achieve equal rights](#) for all people with a [disability](#), so that they can access the same opportunities, goods and areas that everyone else has access to.

Child/teen/young person activist: [A young person who takes action](#) against an injustice, environmental problem or another cause, before the age of 18.

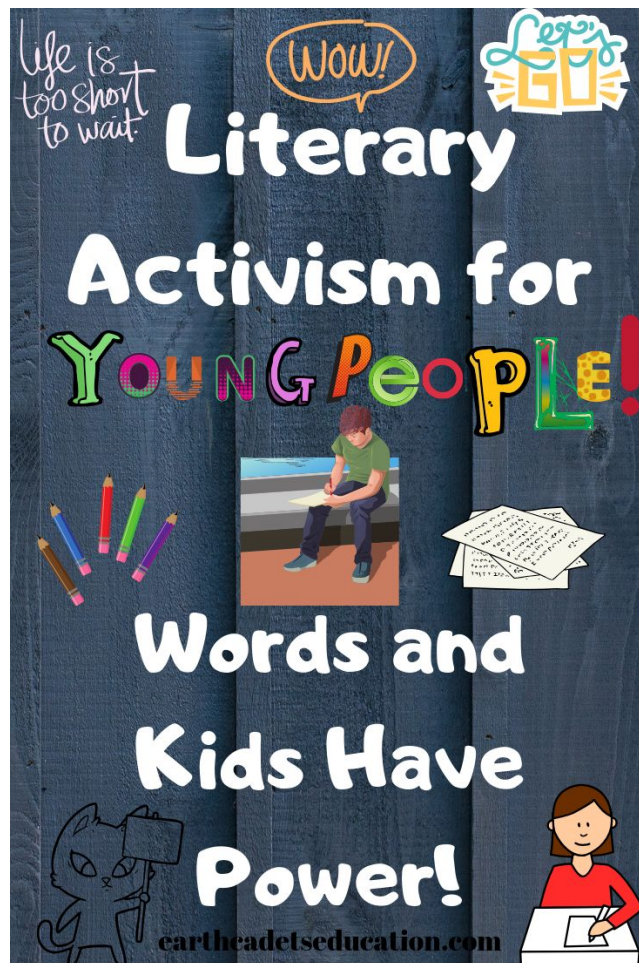
